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# **Program Achievements**

Avivara carries out its primary mission of "...Improving education in Guatemala" through four major educational programs.

# **School Improvement Grants**



Guatemalan schools continue to be significantly underfunded by the Guatemalan government. As a response to this situation, in 2011, Avivara funded the purchase of instructional supplies, teaching materials,

teacher workshops, computers, new classrooms, breakfast programs and classroom furniture & equipment for schools in rural, poverty-impacted villages.

Total number of schools served: 12

Total number of teachers receiving assistance: 48

Total number of students receiving supplies: 1,450+

Total amount of grants provided: \$31,397

# **Scholarships**

This year nine of our scholarship students graduated from high school. Our support and their hard work helped them realize a dream achieved by less than 1% of the young people living in rural Guatemala.



In addition to our high school

graduates, Avivara provided financial assistance to students attending primary school, junior high school, high school and university. Here is breakdown of how we distributed \$17,226 in direct scholarship assistance in 2011.

# **After-School Learning Centers**



The two after-school learning centers that Avivara funds, one in San Pedro Las Huertas and the second in Zacatecas, are filled in the afternoons with students seeking help with their homework and being engaged in creative and critical thinking math and reading activities. These centers, which are staffed

primarily by volunteers, served between 40-70 students each day.

# SAGE (Service & Study Abroad in Guatemala)

Our SAGE Program hosted a small, but passionate group of volunteers this year. They are listed below with their affiliations and the projects where they focused their energies:

**Tanja Schuon:** Licensed Physical Therapist, worked with patients at the Obras Sociales Herman Pedro Hospital and in the San Pedro Las Huertas After School Learning Center.




# Organizational Accomplishments

This being our fourth year in operation and having most of our major systems (accounting, charitable organization status, communications, etc.) well established, 2011 was a year when we focused mostly on building upon our past successes.

The first item of note was the continued growth of our donor base. This chart shows the increasing number of contributors who have supported our programs since our inception in 2008.



Not surprisingly, this increase in donors matches a similar growth pattern in visits to our website. The graph below shows a comparison of visits to our site made in 2010 (the orange line-5,262 visits) and the total number of visits in 2011 (the blue line-8,440 visits), an overall increase of 60.4%.



# Financial Reports

For the fourth year in a row, Avivara did well financially. Highlights of 2011 included:

- ♦ Surpassing the milestone of **one-quarter of a million dollars** in total contributions since our incorporation in 2008.
- Surpassing more than **\$100,000** in total revenues in 2011.
- Surpassing the milestone of more than **1,000 contributions** since our inception in 2008, and
- ♦ Both Avivara (U.S.) and Asociación Avivará (Guatemala) finishing the year with appropriately modest surpluses.

While Avivara (US) and Asociación Avivará (Guatemala) are linked by a common philosophy and staff, they are actually two separate legal entities with two separate accounting systems. Thus, we are showing their Summary Profit & Loss Statements separately.

When analyzed in greater detail by functional expense, our U.S. expenditures were distributed as follows:

- ♦ Administration: \$ 497, or 0.5% of total expenditures.
- Fundraising: \$7,418, or 8.1% of total expenditures.
- ◆ Educational Programs: \$84,055, or 91.4% of total expenditures.



In Guatemala, Asociación Avivará utilized its revenues prudently and also operated at a modest surplus.

When analyzed in greater detail and with expenses allocated by program area, our Guatemalan expenses were distributed as follows:

- ♦ Administration: \$2,444, or 3.6% of total expenditures.
- ◆ School Improvement Grants: \$31,397, or 46.7% of total expenditures.
- ♦ **Scholarships:** \$22,765, or **33.8%** of total expenditures.
- ◆ After-School Learning Centers: \$8,127, or 12.1% of total expenditures.
- ◆ SAGE Program: \$2,556, or 3.8% of total expenditures
